

## ATCOs, Pregnancy and Controlling-Information Sheet

Air Traffic Control work is demanding. Changes due to pregnancy which normally cause only inconvenience can have significant safety implications in the aviation environment.

An ATCO should cease controlling and notify a specialist in aviation medicine should she feel unwell or if any of the following occur during the period when controlling is permitted during pregnancy (up to 6 weeks prior to your estimated date of delivery (EDD)) Medical advice should be sought from your doctor or midwife:

- 1) Faintness, dizziness or vertigo
- 2) Nausea or vomiting
- 3) Anaemia (Haemoglobin 10g/dL or less)
- 4) Glycosuria or proteinuria (sugar or protein in urine)
- 5) Urinary tract infection
- 6) Any kind of vaginal bleeding (including spotting)
- 7) Abdominal pain
- 8) High blood pressure
