- It's a management decision making tool
- Identifies safety issues (hazards)
- Assesses the risks
- Takes action to minimise the risk
- Assigns ownership of actions and the risk
- Checks that the actions taken are working as expected
- It's not a document ... it's what you do!



So what has this got to do with managing fatigue?

Fatigue is a safety issue and needs to be assessed and managed

Prescriptive Rules are not a Complete Solution

- Open reporting system
- If it's not reported it won't get fixed
- Buy-in top to bottom
- Trust
- Individual responsibility

- Training and education of all staff and managers
- Clear fatigue reporting process
- Feedback
- Simple Surveys
- Ongoing communication

Key Areas (3) Metrics and Data



- Operator identified
- Relevant and robust
- The why as well as the what
- Relevant importance of the risk
- Mitigation development
- Continuous Review Process

Key Areas (4) Gathering Information



- Identification of Trends
- Block and duty hour analysis
- Roster Stability
- Subject matter expert
- Specific review group
- External Information

Ongoing development of fatigue management



- Fatigue should be considered as part of your SMS.
- Fatigue reporting should be encouraged.
- Fatigue should be considered in any event investigation.
- The responsibility for the management of fatigue sits with the organisation and the individual.
- Fatigue Risk Management Systems gives you greater control and flexibility.
